The most pronounced effect of ageing for all people is the progressive loss of skills such as seeing, thinking and physical co-ordination. Our age group should have their eyes tested at least every 2 years, which can pick up any of the common eye diseases such as cataracts, glaucoma, macular degeneration and diabetes. Dementia, multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's disease, seizures, stroke, arthritic conditions, heart disease and sleep apnea are all conditions that should be diagnosed and closely monitored by doctors for how it can effect on our driving ability.

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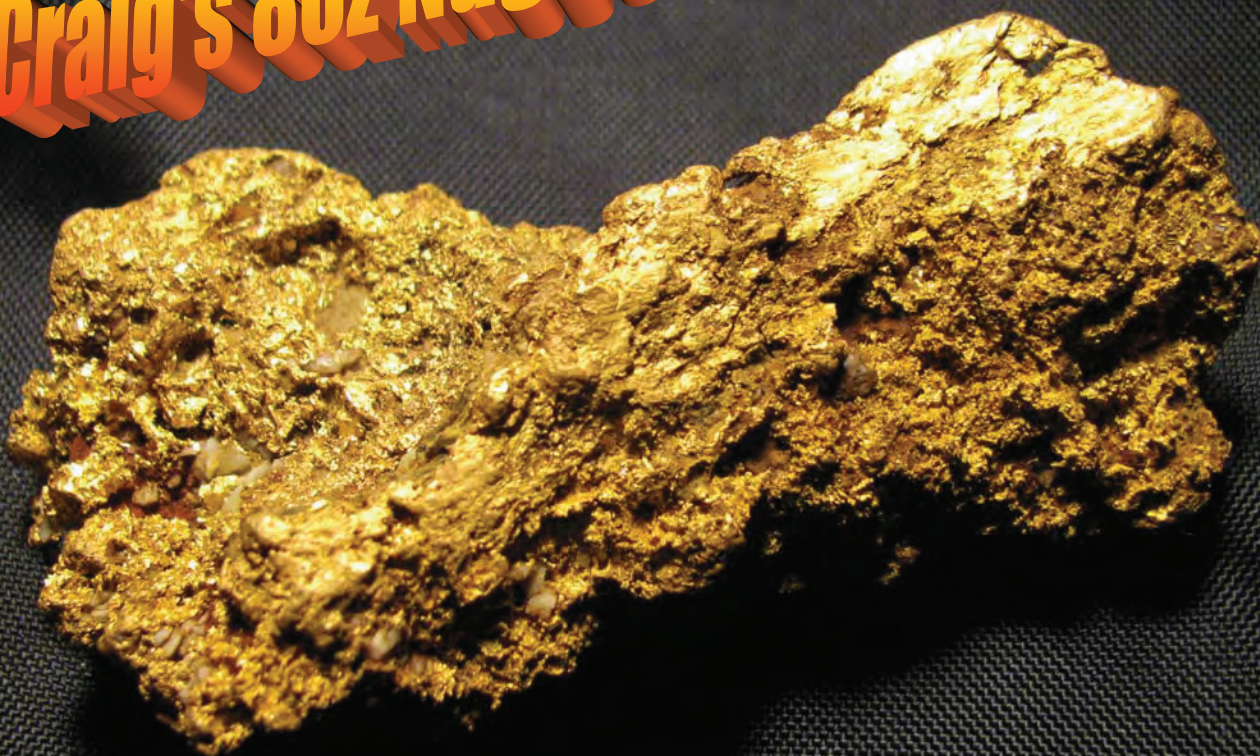

Tibooburra

An enormously successful camp was held at Tibooburra this year with 29 members and 3 visitors attending. The weather gods deemed that while it was cool in the mornings, only one morning saw ice on the car windows. Also the winds which can blow you off 'Fly Speck' hill never eventuated. On the last night the group gathered around Sophie M.'s little 'B & S' outdoor 'fire place', only to be approached by a caravan park visitor to ask whether or not he could join the club. Rob S. introduced him to President Lindsay and with Rob S. gave him full details on the club; its membership and gaols. Another new member! I am assured by the Vice President, (via the President), that this is a new attendance record for the Club at Tibooburra.

Arriving at Tibooburra, the caravan park was totally full, so with other members, the first night was spent close by the granites from which the caravan park is named. However Sophie M., the 'Camp Commandant' had matters under control and members were assured of powered sites the next day as vacancies occurred. After setting up the caravan, we joined the line to see Mavis to purchase a \$10.00 'Permit to Prospect' on the Tibooburra Common.

Up early most mornings with other members, we detected areas like 'Fly Speck' hill and the Common, in the wide area known as the 'National Park fence – bottle on tree' site, alternating search areas most afternoons to other areas to gain experience of these diverse alluvial gold fields. President Lindsay was kept busy by passing on the benefits of his experience to visitors like Jill F., who was a total 'newbie' to gold detecting.

A couple of members had SDC 2300's and were first time 'detectorists'; this gold detector lived up to its reputation and many sub-gram pieces of alluvial gold were dug out of the slates of 'Fly Speck' hill and the 'salt and pepper' surrounding plains.

Members like Judy and visitors like Jill F. both equipped with 2300's found good sized nugglets for the first time. Jill with a great deal of difficulty as her SDC headphones broke on the second day of the camp. Resorting to the detector's internal speaker she was still able to find gold. Well done!

On the Tuesday night (11 July), an unusual event happened in that both Rob S. and Eric G. approached President Lindsay with a local ABC reporter from Broken Hill. Sophie was looking for an unusual 'human

interest' story, and when she heard that the Victorian Seekers Club members were in town sought out both President Lindsay and Vice President Eric for a recorded radio interview which was to be played on Broken Hill ABC radio in the future. More publicity for the club.

A visit to the 'Tunnel Hill' site clearly indicated that this area had been cleaned out by previous detectorists, judging by the number of new holes. That afternoon, a four wheel drive with a couple of blokes in it, stopped and had a conversation with President Lindsay, they indicated they had camped in the locale for a fortnight and had gone over this hill with 2300's cleaning out all the sizeable gold. 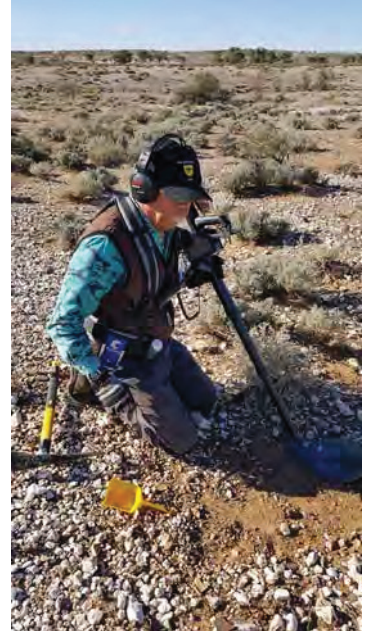
There were many members and visitors who were successful for the first time, my apologies as I have forgotten all your names. But to all who attended this memorable camp, *'Well done to you all.'*

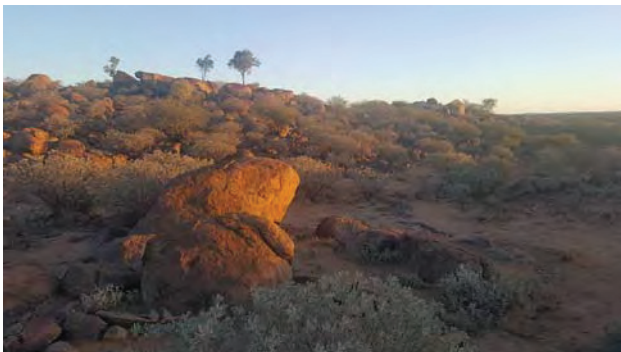

Beginners Luck

I recently found an undetected patch of good gold nuggets in the Victorian Golden Triangle. Right by a track that people have driven over for years. Yes there is a fair amount of trash around, but it just looked too good. A few junk pieces and my first piece was over one gram and not too deep. I have been back twice and am over the ounce mark with the biggest up until last week being 8.6 grams. When my brother who has never detected for gold before saw this he needed to book a flight from NZ and come out and join our Dad and detect the patch.

We borrowed a Minelab GPX5000 with the Coiltek 14" Elite Mono attached from a friend who said it was a "damn good coil." Not running the coil on my GPX I still managed to find a few deeper bits, but my brother was determined to go over and over the ground again. I tell you what, between the coil, settings and his damn good persistence and the lesson to go slow and low he found 2 more bits where I had been over.

Then I took off to leave him with it whilst I went wandering to see if the patch would continue further down the slope. When I came back I said "How'd you go brother?" He rattled the jar and popped out a



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solid 1.7 grammar. "Good on you mate" I said excited for him, then he had this grin and said I also got this one! And pulled out of his pocket (obviously I gave him a jar too small) what I thought was going to be a quartz specimen, but when he dropped it into my waiting hand I could immediately feel the weight.



NO way, No way, No WAY man. Yes way! and right by the track under a tree covered by a couple of old limbs. I went pale and he and Dad went into cheers. His forth gold nugget EVER and it is a 141 grammar or just shy of 5 ounces. Beginners luck? And the right equipment. He had to leave in another day but gold fever had set in and he was on fire. Even widening the patch with 2 quite deep targets he said were faint signals. It's a shame I did not see it happen, or video it on my phone to add to the YouTube I have of this patch.

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\$60,000 of gold stolen from a West Australian mine site by three men having a barbecue

The fate of \$60,000 of gold stolen from a West Australian mine site by three men having a barbecue is set to be decided by a Kalgoorlie court.

The rare gold nugget was stolen from a live mining tenement near the ghost town of Kunanalling, 32 kilometres north of Coolgardie, on June 4 last year.

Andrew Mark Warren, Stephen Lindsay Rowe and Michael James Forward pleaded guilty to attempting to defraud tenement owner Evolution Mining by stealing the gold.

A fourth man, Glen Stephen Rutherford, pleaded not guilty to any involvement in the theft.

Warren and Forward were due to be sentenced for the theft in the Kalgoorlie Magistrates Court on Monday, only for sentencing to be delayed until March 27 by Rowe's guilty plea.

Police prosecutor Thomas Banyard told the court he would also lodge an order for all gold recovered to be forfeited to the State Government.

The ABC understands the prosecution will argue that because the gold was stolen from under the ground, it remains the property of the state, rather than Evolution as the tenement holder.

"My understanding is the mining company loses out," Senior Constable Banyard told the court. Magistrate John O'Sullivan said the renewed delay would

give Evolution the opportunity to make counter-submissions to the prosecution's claim.

An Evolution spokesman said the company was monitoring the case, but "it would not be appropriate to make any further comment as the matter is still before the courts".

MEN STOPPED FOR BARBECUE, STUMBLED ONTO GOLD

Earlier, the court heard the men had been on an unsuccessful prospecting trip when they stopped at Kunanalling for a barbecue.

Senior Constable Banyard said the men decided to explore the bottom of a disused mining pit nearby, where one of them stumbled over the large chunk of gold.

He said the men then used their metal detectors to recover more than a kilogram of gold, worth an estimated \$62,390.

Detectives said the largest specimen — a rare gold leaf-type nugget — was smashed to pieces.

While the move allowed the men to divide the gold into 300 gram shares, it potentially cost them up to three times the nugget's estimated value, due to its status as a potential collector's item.

"It may have seemed like they were winning the lotto, but they did not have permission to be on the tenement or remove the gold," Senior Constable Banyard told the court.

SOCIAL MEDIA BOAST ALERTED POLICE

The men's decision to pose with the gold for a Facebook photo eventually proved a critical error, with the Gold Stealing Detection Unit (GSDU) alerted to the theft.

Senior Constable Banyard said GSDU detectives seized 675g of the gold from a property in Boulder, while 300g was sold to a Kalgoorlie prospecting business.

Editor's Note: The moral of this story:

If you are detecting on an old lease or tenement make sure that it is inactive and expired or that you have the leaseholder's permission to detect on the lease.

There will be a gold buyer offering top dollar, and for \$10 you can have your gold (up to 2 oz) smelted into an ingot. There will be others offering gold, camping and 4wd displays and tours, detector settings and tuition, a gold panning competition, a 'stake you claim' event, lectures from Andrew Bales on 'how to find patches of gold' and a auction of prospecting equipment.
