Aussie Gold Finders Reveal “The Great Gold Nugget Fraud”



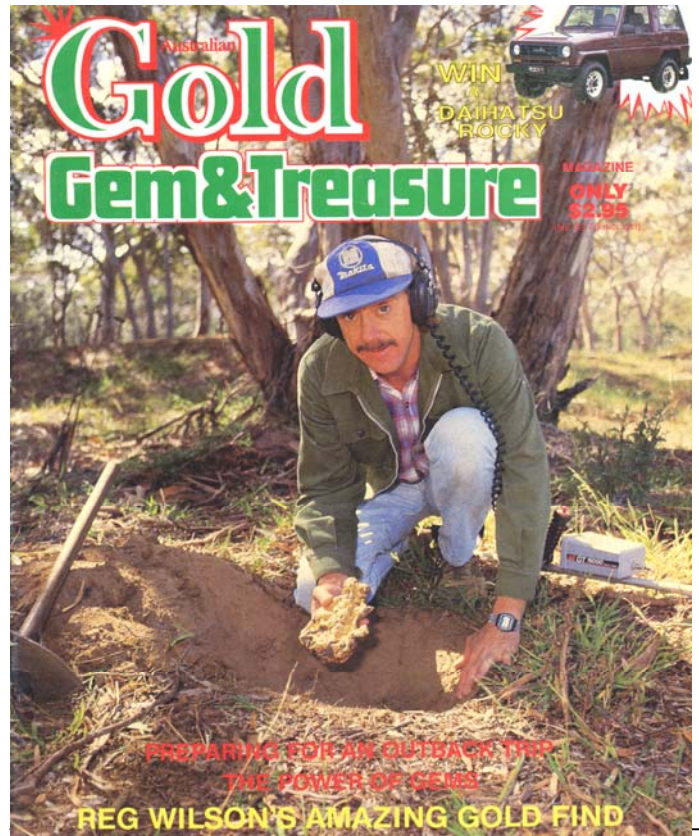
The Nugget as shown by the Auctioneer in 2011.

An Australian prospector claims a giant gold nugget, purportedly found in Nevada County that fetched \$460,000 at auction, actually came from Australia's Golden Triangle.

Murray Cox, 56, of Geelong, Victoria, contacted News10 after seeing a picture of the so-called Washington Nugget in a gold mining magazine. “I picked up the magazine and knew in two seconds that was (our nugget),” Cox said. Cox said he and a friend, Reg Wilson, unearthed the giant nugget in November 1987 in a farm field near the town of Balarat, north of Melbourne. Cox provided a 1987 article from the Melbourne Sun newspaper describing the event, along with a Sun photograph of the two men holding the giant nugget they called Orange Roughie because of its fish-like shape. The newspaper listed the nugget's weight at 98 ounces, the same as the Washington Nugget.

Cox also provided a picture of the Orange Roughie nugget he said was taken by a professional photographer about a week after the discovery. That photograph, shot from roughly the same angle as a pre-auction picture of the Washington Nugget, shows a striking similarity between the two. “We know it's our nugget. 100 percent,” Cox said. He said Wilson sold the Orange Roughie nugget to an American gold dealer in 1989 for AU \$50,000, which at the time reflected the value of the actual gold content. The Washington Nugget sold at auction at the Sacramento Convention Center on March 16 for \$460,000, including sales commission. The sales price was roughly triple the actual value of the gold in the nugget, in part, because it was portrayed as the largest surviving specimen from California's Gold Country.

Huge gold nugget not from California

A 6.2-pound hunk of gold was auctioned for nearly half a million dollars in March after a man claimed he found it on his Sierra Nevada property, but it turns out it was actually dug up decades earlier in Australia.

After Jim Sanders' "find" on his property near Nevada City in California's Gold Country made news last year, Australian prospector Murray Cox compared pictures of Sanders' "Washington Nugget" with "The Orange Roughie" he unearthed near Melbourne in 1987, it was reported.

They were an exact match, except the Washington Nugget sold for \$460,000 in March and Cox originally sold it for \$50,000. Cox contacted Don Kagin, a coin dealer, and mining geologist Fred Holabird, who together auctioned the nugget for Sanders. The two investigated Cox's claims and determined he was right. "The parties have mutually concluded that the nugget was from Australia," Holabird said Tuesday in a statement.

As for how Sanders got his hands on the Aussie gold chunk? The dealers said confidentiality agreements barred them from elaborating.

Cox said that he sold the Orange Roughie in 1989 and is not sure how it wound up with Sanders. The person who bought the gold in March has been reimbursed, and the nugget sold for a smaller price to another bidder.

Despite duping people as to the nugget's origin, Kagin said everyone involved has agreed that fraud charges against Sanders are unnecessary. "The whole matter has been concluded to everyone's satisfaction," he said.

The unusual gold chunk fetched \$460,000 at auction because it was believed to be the largest California nugget left in existence. While details of the 98.6-ounce nugget's new sale price were not available, gold closed at \$1,529.20 an ounce Wednesday.

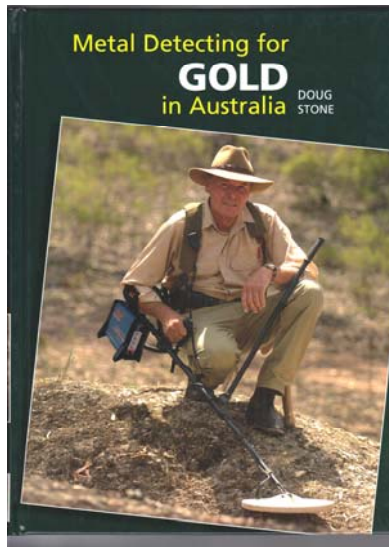

Doug Stone has released through Outdoor Press a new edition, a reprint and a book map.

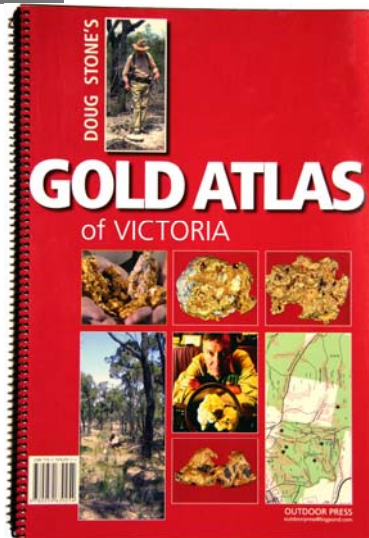
