

Even though Les has been metal detecting since 1966 [very crude detectors them days], he had never used Minelab detectors for his gold recovery. Les belongs to the Quartzite Metal Detecting Club in Arizona which has 600 members, who mainly sluice and dry blow for their gold which is very small, [like ours lately] . They have access to about 200 recreation mining claims that allow a very regulated use of machinery to open up old tailing dumps.

Les is also a life member of the local coin and relic club in Kansas City near his home of which he was the president for 22 years [I have a long way to go]. 




