General Meetings

At our February meeting it was a pleasure not to put up with the noisy music next door, allowing us to hear ourselves speak, hopefully, we do not go through that again. Attendances at the meetings lately have filled our room to almost capacity, boosted by many new and potential members, which is a healthy sign.

Peter Maffey gave us a very interesting and well informed presentation on the forgotten Boer War in South Africa, in which Australia participated during 1899-1901. It was a war against the Dutch Boers, by the British, who wanted to have control of the colony and for the access to the very rich gold deposits discovered there. Like lambs to the slaughter, Australia sent in large contingencies of troops and bush rifleman to help support the mother country, as we also did in the Second World War. We suffered over 1,000 casualties in this conflict, so it was quite a significant part of our history which wasn't until recently, recognized at the Canberra War Memorial with a remembrance display.

Because Peter's uncle, (Captain Maffey) participated in this war, and left many artifacts and medals of his (displayed to us), Peter felt very strongly about the war not being represented at the Canberra War Memorial. He helped to form a committee a few years ago with other like-minded to raise funds to correct the situation. They worked very hard with this and after much lobbying governments and individuals around the country were able to finally reach their aim after raising half of the required \$4,000,000 (the government contributed the rest) , resulting in a magnificent display being erected last year for all to see and reflect on. Peter's talk was backed up with many historic books and artifacts and a fund raising DVD.



New Products

SteelPhase sP01 Audio Enhance



A new Audio enhancer has been released by Phase Technical and this one promises to fill the shortcomings of other enhancers that we have seen over the years. It has been developed through a collaboration between SteelPat and Phase Technical. The latter business is headed by Nenad Lonic, a name that many of us would recognise from the time that he was the technical support expert with Minelab.

In the words of Nenad;

"I've tried a lot of boosters over the years and most of them did the same thing when connecting an external speaker to them, but some still coloured or distorted the sound.

I was a big pain in Minelab engineers backside to get a good booster into the GPXs for this reason. The detector's Target Volume setting does a good job, but if you crank it too high you can get an erratic machine, causing a required drop in Rx Gain. This is even more evident in the GPZ 7000, and users are well aware by now how much more stable the GPZ runs with a lower Volume setting, BUT, target signals are then harder to hear.

The SteelPhase gives you an extra level of control. When using stereo headphones, the Mode switch gives you 2 types of sound. The Mode 1 position I call normal. Mode 2 changes the sound - it sounds really crisp and somewhat "surround". You can hunt in this all the time or use it as a secondary "target check". It also features a 3 position Filter control, which sets different sound parameters to further customize the sound. Different detectors, headphones and peoples ears all react differently, so you can really tailor the audio to get the perfect sound from your detector. I would find it really hard to go prospecting without one now."

It is early days yet but the feedback on the forums so far is very positive.





Large gold nugget found in Western Australia

The unearthing of the large gold nugget follows a suite of discoveries in the area over the past month leaving prospectors hopeful for even bigger yields in the near future. A LARGE gold nugget weighing over half a kilo has been unearthed in Mertondale in the goldfields of Western Australia, close to a now abandoned mining area. The nugget weighed in at exactly 21 ounces (670.3 grams) and was discovered by prospectors of a relatively young mining company, Magnetic Resources.

It's been a record few months for the prospectors who have found more than 50 ounces— worth around \$82,700— of large gold nuggets in the area, all discovered at shallow depths with just a metal detector. The area between Leonora and Laverton, where the string of gold nuggets have been dug up is located on pastoral land. But George doesn't see this as an issue.

"We have acted quickly to ensure Magnetic benefits from any nuggets recovered by signing a tribute agreement with the local pastoralist."

Magnetic Resources is now exploring the area for more nuggets.

"We are very impressed by the size of these nuggets, 10oz and 21oz, which appear to have come from an underlying bedrock source near existing aeromagnetic targets in an emerging gold province," said the Magnetic Resources managing director George Sakalidis.

Man finds enormous gold nugget in North Queensland

AN enormous gold nugget has been found by a man in North Queensland.

The prospector found the 1.1763kg gold nugget (37.7 troy oz.) in a field in the Charters Towers region worth about \$63.814.

The nugget was 15cm below the ground and discovered using a Minelab GPX 5000 detector.

"When I found the first nugget I was super stoked because that was my biggest ever," the Queenslander said, who wishes to remain anonymous. "I would have been really happy with just that but after I'd calmed down, I went back to the same spot, restarted my detector and after just two or three swings I found the big one. "It's fair to say I was emotionally overwhelmed at that time," he said.

The man had been searching a particular area for a while that day and was ready to leave. "But I gave it another quarter of an hour and then with five minutes left I got this fairly good signal — not too loud but I was confident it was gold — so I started digging.

"At first, I didn't know just how big the nugget was because the scales I had with me only went up to 500 grams. It wasn't until later when I got home I found **Out** I'd broken the kilo mark."

"It was beneath some vegetation so it was a bit of a challenge to get to, but now I'm thinking maybe those roots are keeping some other big nuggets safe ready to be found another time."



Mining downturn prompts out -of-work miners to eke out a living prospecting for gold

An East Kimberley prospector says the mining downturn is forcing more people to go in search of gold to make ends meet.

(ABC News)

Martin Ynema owns mining leases around the old Halls Creek town site, the birthplace of Western Australia's gold rush in the late 1800s. He said a lot more people were trying to make a living by prospecting for gold and they were not necessarily following the rules.

"What's happened is a lot of people are now out of work, so they're buying detectors and going anywhere where they think they can find their fortune so they can retire," Mr Ynema said. "As long as the detector points in that direction that's where they go. "They don't seem to worry too much about whose properties or leases they are or if they're encroaching on anyone's toes."

Mr Ynema said he was frequently contacted by prospectors wanting to stay at his accommodation in the old town of Halls Creek. He said he was happy for them to prospect on his leases in exchange for supplies, but many did not bother to ask for permission. By his estimation, prospecting for precious metals and stones had increased by 200 to 300 per cent in the Kimberley in the past few years. "Maybe one in a thousand make a good quid out of it," he said. "The rest of them really lose money ... it's a lot harder than what most of them think. "Some of them are very lucky; they strike the odd patch. They might get a few ounces, but [for] most of them it's a matter of hundreds of little pieces for a gram."

But despite the odds, Mr Ynema said he believed prospecting would continue to grow in popularity. "The less money that's in the system, the more people will go out prospecting," he said. "They'll go back to panning dishes, small sluices, anything they can get 10 or 20 dollars a day so they can live."

Prospectors need written permission. The Department of Mines and Petroleum confirmed prospecting had increased in popularity in Western Australia in recent years. Executive director mineral titles Dr Ivor Roberts said a miner's right was required to pros-

pect on crown land, including pastoral leases and vacant crown land.

"Anyone wishing to prospect within the area of an exploration licence must have written permission from the tenement holder or apply for a 40E permit," he said. "Written permission from the tenement holder must be obtained for anyone who wants to prospect on a mining lease or prospecting licence area."

On a pastoral lease, prospectors cannot not go within 100 metres of an occupied building or within 400 metres of a livestock watering point without permission from the pastoralist. Heavy fines apply for unauthorised mining.
