We had a mixed bag of luck this weekend, but we all enjoyed the visit.



Good TV viewing on the road.....

We criticize our communications ministry for poor choices but when you consider we have nearly 5000 transmitters across the country we are not doing too badly. That is one transmitter for every 5200 people. The areas not covered by city, regional or small community transmitters or translators as they stand are

- Northern part of the SA state
- Much of North and Central WA
- Southern part of Northern Territory

All other areas have a transmitter or transmitters available. There has been a big swing to Satellite dishes because the basic of receiving TV reception has not been understood and the sale of dishes has been promoted by those who will benefit from the sale. The administration associated with that is a chore.

In Australia our signals come in 2 formats:

Horizontal and Vertical polarity, and even the manufacturers who put round things on roofs do not understand. This is then **exacerbated** by the following fact:

Small output transmitters are often polarized in a vertical pattern and a fixed antenna cannot be adjusted for this type of signal transmission – result: no picture and TV antennas get a bad name. But really it is a lack of knowledge both from the caravanner and the manufacturer alike.

Good decisions are based on facts not hearsay.

Bush User petition calls for Public Land Inquiry

Bush Users have rallied to launch a petition calling for a State Government Parliamentary Inquiry into public land management in Victoria.

The petition created by the Bush User Group United (BÚGU) is sponsored by Shadow Assistant Minister for Public Land Use and The Nationals Member for Eastern Victoria Region, Melina Bath.

Ms Bath said bush users are expressing legitimate concerns on the direction of public land management under Daniel Andrews' leadership.

"Time and time again bush users and regional communities have stated they do not want to be denied access to public land that have had access to for generations.

"There are increasing concerns the Andrews Labor Governments public land policy is a lock out and leave approach," said Ms Bath.

"Regional communities are deeply connected with the bush and public land and they

understand its importance to our ignored. regional economy.

"Bush users are fighting to be heard and crying out for a balanced approach that supports sustainable industries, tourism and recreational pursuits while maintaining environmental safeguards.

"Open and transparent consultation must be undertaken.

"It is imperative public land and national parks are not locked up and tracks closed or neglected."

The Bush Users petition calls for a review of the state

government advisory body Victorian

Environmental Assessment Council (VEAC).

Ms Bath said bush users such as hikers, prospectors and miners, 4WD enthusiasts, horse riders, recreational hunters and campers feel their needs are being





A car stalling after being driven a short distance can be caused by a variety of faults with the engine. Start by checking there is no debris in the fuel line, if its clear check the vacuum pipes and hoses on the intake manifold also check all ground wires, if none of these work it could be that the fuel pump itself is faulty causing low delivery pressure to the injectors. Hope this helps. John
