Feature article: Deep Leads

Deep leads are buried gold-bearing river channel deposits which were later buried beneath late-Cainozoic (23-5 million years ago) alluvium, basalt or both.

In the heads of valleys or gullies, the leads were often shallow and worked by individuals or small parties in the early days of mining. Further along their courses the leads were more deeply buried and often extensive drilling was required to locate their sinuous courses.

The two most productive areas of deep lead mining in the state were the Ballarat West (Sebastopol 63 tonne of gold) and the group of mines working the Berry, Australasian and Hepburn leads from Creswick to Ullina (58 tonne of gold).

Within the deep leads, the goldbearing gravel was commonly up to one metre thick and 100 metre wide in a lead 300 metres wide. Gold values were in the order of 10-20 grams cubic metre of wash.

The leads were extensively mined underground at Ballarat West from 1855 to 1872.

In the Creswick area the alluvial mines

started in the 1870's or later and were worked through to roughly 1914.

WATER SHORTAGE ? Then what about this-

Specialized equipment and techniques were required to cope with the weak ground and the enormous guantities of ground water flowing through these buried river courses. Companies such as the Spring Hill and Central Leads mine, north of Creswick, were faced with continuous and heavy pumping of up to 9 million litres per day and further north, the Charlotte Plains Company were forced to pump 28 million litres per day for six years prior to mining and then continue to lift 22 million litres per day during mining. The return of the natural water level after such prolonged dewatering operations takes many years. In the Hopkins Valley, water in the new Langi Logan shaft stood at 12 metres prior to dewatering. The lead was worked to 91 metres and operations ceased in 1925. By 1934 the water level was still 45 metres from the surface.
