General meetings

JULY

At our July meeting, much discussion was had about the VEAC Final Report on the Central West Investigation and how we stand to lose 60% of now available prospecting ground on public land, and how it will affect us. We stand to lose our popular areas of Chute and Mountain Hut. (See the summarized list of changes to the parks in separate article on p7).

Our speaker was Mac from Weigh Station, who provides a mobile weighing service for caravans, trailers etc and their towing vehicles. He pointed out the importance of complying with our vehicle's legal towing limits, as it may

mean a hefty fine or put our insurance cover at risk. Accurate Tow Ball Mass (TBM) measurement is vital both for compliance and the effect it has on your Gross Vehicle Mass (GVM), and that the GVM of some vehicles may change depending on the Tow Ball Mass. His service is to come out to your van and tow vehicle, check all relevant weights and provide a comprehensive printed report and highlight any areas of concern. He can also issue Weigh Bridge tickets acceptable to both Vic Roads and VASS Engineers for Registration Purposes or GVM upgrades. 

VEAC Final Report Summary

Total area of public land under investigation: 161,213Ha

Area available for recreational prospecting—now 103,871Ha; after, 41,158Ha. A loss of 62,713Ha or 60%

National Parks (including existing State Parks)(no prospecting) now 22,967Ha; after 73,113Ha. A gain of 50,146Ha or 218.3%.

The Wellsford north area of 3,152 Ha was changed from a Nature Reserve, as proposed in the Draft Report to the Bendigo National Park to allow horse riding, but still no prospecting. As we have access to most of the existing Bendigo NP, why are we now excluded from this area?

Nature Reserves (no prospecting - formerly called Nature Conservation Reserves where prospecting was generally allowed) now 6,703Ha; after 8051Ha. A gain of 1,348Ha. or 19.7%

The VEAC investigation into statewide public land in 2017 recommended that all Nature Conservation Reserves be called Nature Reserves. At the moment we have access to many of these outside the investigation area (Wedderburn, Inglewood, Heathcote, Whroo, Tarnagulla and Talbot). VEAC say they do not want us in their Nature Reserves, so how long

will it be before the bureaucrats extend that exclusion to the above coveted areas?

<u>Conservation Reserves (new category)(no prospecting)</u> now none; after 5,246Ha

State Forests (prospecting allowed) now 89,278Ha; after 11,901Ha. A loss of 77,477Ha or 86.6%.

The only State forests will be in the Pyrenees/MtCole region. The Pyrenees State Forest will be reduced from 14765Ha to 3099Ha to allow all activities, (good luck with that, as it is very steep country with very little access).

Regional Parks (prospecting allowed) now 5,264Ha; after 24,992Ha. A gain of 19,728Ha or 374.7%. Most of these are located near towns to allow fire wood collecting with little consideration for prospecting.

Bushland Reserves

(prospecting allowed) now 1,047H; after 2807Ha. A gain of 1,760Ha or 168%

Historic Reserves

(prospecting allowed) no change -1457Ha

Comments:

Prime prospecting areas to lose are in the Proposed Ben Major and Waterloo Nature Reserves and the Mountain Hut area of the Pyrenees National park.

No evidence to show we are a high impact activity.

We are considered to be an extractive activity (removing bullets, rubbish and a teaspoon of gold a year if we are lucky!)

Laws banning recreation prospecting will only stop access to the law abiding bush user, it will not stop the ones that currently have no regard for the environment.

Are we worse than 4WDs and trail bikes who are allowed into the parks?

Changes from the Draft Report to the Final Report:

National parks

Draft 72,833Ha—Final 73,113Ha: a gain of 280Ha

State Forests

Draft 10,180Ha—Final 11,901Ha: a gain of 1,721Ha

Regional Parks

Draft 23,559Ha—Final 24,993Ha: a gain of 1,434Ha

Nature Reserves

Draft 11,204Ha—Final 8,051Ha: a drop of 3153Ha

Other reserves did not change.

I do not know of the prospecting areas in the Wombat/ Daylesford segment that we may lose. Other PMAV members may help with that. Page 8 SEP/OCT 2019

Most members thought that anyone going to this camp must have rocks in their head to even think of heading out in the severe conditions predicted of inches of rain, 100kph winds and wet slippery roads. It was even suggested that we cancel the event.

Redcastle is a challenge for gold, as the alluvial areas are not as extensive as most other areas, but persevere we did, and some surprising nuggets were found, notably a beautiful 37.6g by Andrew M and a couple at 3.5g by Ken and Mal. It is ironic that Andrew did well, as his great-great grandfather prospected the same area over 100 years ago, so now he has a great memento of his family history.

Due to the small attendance, we did not have a raffle, but we all enjoyed our time there and look forward to returning in the future.

A form will be provided if you wish to take part in the competition - simply fill it out as you complete each activity. Committee members will be on hand to assist. Prizes will be awarded for each category but make sure you are back at the rotunda by 2.30 pm with your completed form. For a more relaxed day you can take a walk around the park or just kick back for a cuppa and a chat.
