#### **Prospector Fined**

It was reported on Facebook by PMAV that a prospector near Maryborough was fined \$1652 for breaking the "non essential" rule. Something like 260 comments on Facebook in response to this. The PMAV apparently lobbied Government to make local prospectors exempt but were not successful. Apparently Parks Victoria have put up signs in some parks warning about prospecting during the restrictions.

The Tibooburra Common is closed until further notice and Sophie advises that Gumvale and Mount Stewart are also closed. The Tibooburra trip may still happen right up to September if restrictions are lifted.

#### Annual Fees on Hold

the federal and state governments will give a reasonable amount of notice but you never know so keep an eye on your email box for any urgent updates.

## Modifications / Improvements to an SDC 2300 Metal Detector. By & © Copyright to Eddie S. M. Tricker.

#### <u> Part One – A Bungee Cord Fixing Point</u>

This is the first part of a series of five (5) short articles dealing with improvements and modifications I have carried out to my own SDC 2300 metal detector.

Since I purchased my SDC 2300 back in April 2017, I have carried out a series of modifications and improvements to it that cater for my physical limitations these days and suit my style of detecting.

Old war injuries, (yes, the Vietnam War) in the form of left-hand shoulder, (I am left-handed), and back injuries make it hard for me to detect all day long standing up. So, once I have isolated my target to a small heap of soil, gravel, or whatever, I like to get down on my knees, unclip the detector from my bungee and use my shovel, passing it over the back of my coil.

The SDC also has a couple of inbuilt features that with the benefit of modification's can be improved upon. The one I have in mind here, is the small fold up arm rest, which will be the subject of a future article in this series. But the SDC also does not have any provision on it to hook in a bungee cord arrangement to take the weight off the user's arm.

#### A Bungee Loop Fixing Point

But one of the most convenient modification ideas to the SDC came from Graham M. Graham made me aware of the fact, up at Tibooburra, that the SDC had been fitted with screw threaded holes at the top outer edges of its handle; the top folding hinge point. To these holes he had fitted a small loop of strong cable tie held in place by two small fine threaded stainless-steel bolts.

This was like an "Eureka" moment for me. I saw straight away that this 'set-up' would enable me to disconnect and reconnect my detector to and from a bungee cord very quickly.

Graham had been experiencing problems with his arrangement, as the two bolts use to work loose in the field, so he was constantly checking and tightening them.

So, it required a simple additional modification. The application of a couple of lock nuts on either side to hold the bolts in place; to stop them from coming loose in the field, was the answer.

Borrowing one of Graham's 'bungee loops', I took it into my local Bunnings store, and got one of the skilled assistants to match Graham's small bolts, and complete it with sets of matching stainless-steel washers and nuts.



Above photo shows Bungee cable tie loop held in place with stainless-steel bolts, washers and nuts.

#### Materials required to make this Bungee loop set up.

Zenith Round Head 316 Stainless Steel Bolts & Nuts, M3 x12mm, packet of 8.

Zenith Flat Washer 316 Stainless Steel 1/8-inch x M3, packet of 35.

Crescent Cable Ties, 370mm x 7.6mm, packet of 25.

#### All of these materials can be purchased from your local Bunnings or similar hardware store.

You will also require a 'Leather Hole Punch' to enable you to punch a hole through the cable tie at a diameter similar to that of the stainless-steel bolt.

#### The Layout

The sequence for each stainless-steel bolt is this: one s/s washer, the cable tie, followed by another s/s washer, then finally the s/s lock nut. Once each bolt is set up like this; screw the bolt into the threads already provided on the detector, either side of the top of the handle assembly. Screw the lock nut down tight against the body of the handle assembly. You might use a small spanner, (Jeweler's set of spanners and screw drivers), and screw driver to do this. This will lock the bolt in place and prevent it from coming loose.



Close up of Bungee loop assembly anchor point, showing lock nuts and washers, and cable tie loop. There is slack either side of the cable tie so that it folds down very easily when the SDC is folded up to be put away.

The cable tie loop should be large enough to enable the operator to see the LED display clearly, and to enable the operator to operate the green ground balance switch without any hindrance.

I am aware that some folks have suggested that 15mm length bolts would be better, but I have found that the 12mm length bolt is more than adequate. Fully screwed into the handle, it still has a small amount of thread protruding. However, I have been using my set up in my local area now for over two years, and have not had any problems with it at all.

Clearly 'tailored' for the way I carry out my detecting, this Bungee cord attaching point has some very good advantages. It facilitates quick and easy disconnection of the detector from the Bungee cord; allows a relatively easy adjustment to the Bungee cord length, therefore height of the coil above the ground surface; and almost instant reconnection by 'slapping' the attachment clip against the hard-plastic cable tie, etc., etc.

Ensuing articles dealing with improvements to the SDC metal detector will follow in subsequent editions of the newsletter.

#### The Detector's warranty?

In my opinion, none of the modifications / improvements I have made to my 2300, are such that they would invalidate the 3-year MINELAB warranty of the SDC detector.
