President's Report

I am pleased to announce that we have a new Treasurer, Kevin Hubbard. Kevin has a short story about himself elsewhere in the newsletter. I can assure you that after talking with Kevin about his work history including the use of SAP (world class finance software) he is more than qualified to take on MYOB and the treasurer role.

Thanks, must again go to Pam Griffin who for some time has been Treasurer and the Membership Secretary. Fortunately for Pam covid meant that her membership duties had to take a back seat as we could not take on any new members while we were not able to have general meeting and camps.

At the general meeting Jim D and Pam were recognised with a bottle of wine for their additional contributions during 2020 / 21.

New / Prospective Members

With all the TV shows about prospecting for gold, and with the price of gold and the covid lockdown people have been contacting the club in record numbers. As of last count we had over 70 people showing interest in the club. Clearly we could not simply invite them all to our normal meetings and camps so it called for a different approach.

Step one was to ascertain how serious these prospective members (PM) were and all of them were sent an email. The email asked them a bunch of questions e.g. are you still interested, do you have a van or camping gear, a detector, a miners right etc. Those PM showing interest (about 30 %) were invited to a 2 hour Information and Question session in Jells Park.

The information and question session for PM in Jells was met by light rain but we found a shelter for the 30 odd PM that came along. Eric, Lindsay and I gave them a bunch of useful information and at the end of the session about a half of them indicated that they had all the necessary equipment and were ready to attend bush camps in the next few months. A smaller number said they were missing some equipment or were not quite ready and would be in touch with us further down the track. Pam G did a lot of preparation prior to the meeting and had application forms, newsletter maps and copies of the members handbook for those members who had the highest potential for joining. Pam was kept very busy recording names and talking to most of the PM's. Thanks to Briony, Dean, Paul G, Thomas, Francine & François for help on the day. On balance it was felt that we could use this approach again later this year while covid is affecting the way we operate.

In March at Kingower and at Easter a lot of potential new members will be present and field officers and experienced members will be requested to help out with training and guidance on this weekend.

General Meeting

In February we had our first general meeting in almost a year and about 35 attended. Monash Halls have requested that we comply with several covid rules. For example all names and phone numbers had to be recorded on entry, the numbers in the hall and kitchen are limited, we had to carry masks and wear them when social distancing was not possible. The committee also discussed and implemented a number of our covid requirements including regular sanitizing, hall signage / reminders, kitchen staff wearing gloves and masks and rules around food handling.

For those who may have thought these measures were a little bit over the top, the very next day an infected quarantine worker was reported to have visited shops in Clayton, Springvale, Brandan Park etc. I was actually in the same Kmart he visited on the same day but I was there mid morning and he was there late afternoon.

On top of this the outbreak associated with the Holiday Inn has just resulted in another state wide lockdown and the cancellation of the Talbot camp. I was planning on going to Talbot on Saturday morning but heard the rumours of another lockdown and was on the phone to the camp duty officer, Eric, a couple of minutes after the premier made his announcement at 1 pm on Friday. It took an hour or so but I am proud that the committee and members were able to make the sensible and safe decision and cancel the camp.





It was a great turn out with approxi-




Not much gold was found; could this be it isn't there or it was too hot to go detecting after lunch?
