Historic Book Donation



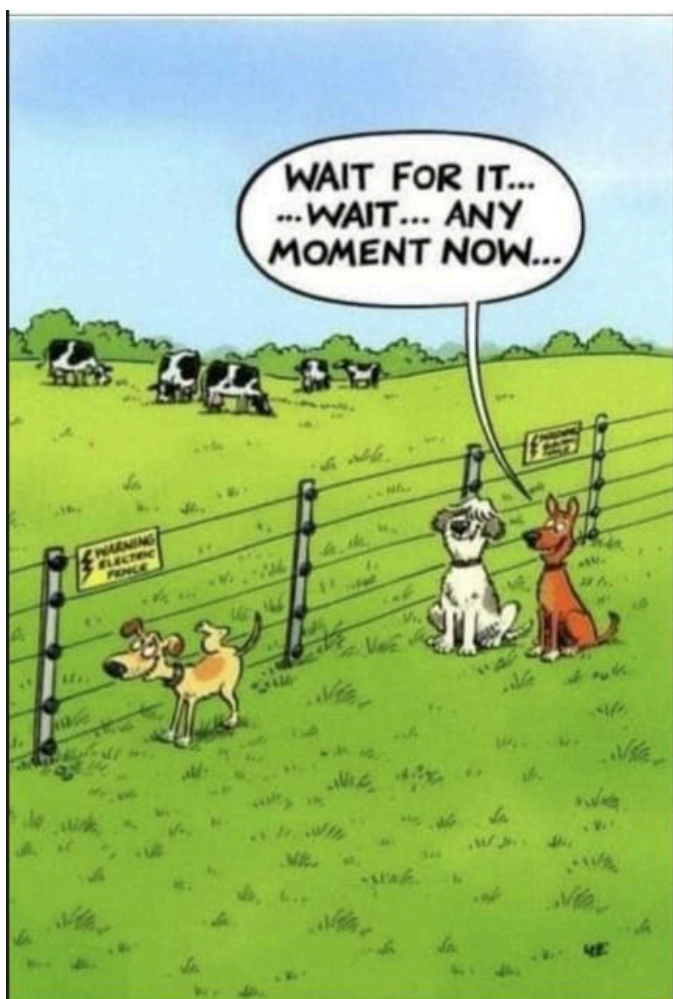
Certificates of Appreciation

MEMBERS PLEASE NOTE

**By now most members would be aware of
the different covid related announcements
which are made at the end of restrictions /
lockdowns, and the need to stay flexible.
Where public gatherings are restricted to
10 no official seekers camp will take place.**

The Victorian Seekers Club Vaccination Policy.

As you are all aware the club has an older and potentially
more covid susceptible age group. We also have had
members who have voiced real concern about mixing
with members, visitors or guests who are not double vac-
cinated. Both Monash Halls (meeting room) and the
Tarnagulla Recreation Reserve are insisting that all at-
tendees are to be double vaccinated and need to prove it
via an official vaccination certificate and sign in etc. With
the emerging Omicron strain it is possible that things
could change again and members will be updated via
email of anything important that may affect club activities.

Monash Halls have given very clear instructions regarding use of their facilities and it includes the following requirements.

The club needs to appoint a covid marshal(s) (Michael D & Paul H)

All person over 16 must provide proof of full vaccination (digital or hard copy certificate) or an authorised exemption from a medical practitioner

Everyone needs to complete the VSC attendance register

Attendance is capped at 4 msq per person and maintain social distancing.

All persons attending are still to wear a mask if social distancing is not possible

We have also been in contact with the Tarnagulla Recreation Reserve and they also have a requirement for proving double vaccination and signing an attendance register etc.

The VSC committee has spent some time discussing our policy with respect to member requirement for covid vaccinations and proof thereof. In coming to this policy decision, we have taken into account the Vic government / department of health guidelines, the requirement of Monash Halls, DELWP, the risks as well as the age and general health of our members. The committee also feels that this policy and associated procedures also provides a level of legal protection should something untoward happen.

The Victorian Seekers Club policy in relation to covid and vaccinations is as follows :-

The VSC encourages all members to be vaccinated for their own health and the health of others they interact with, including fellow club members. If still in doubt about vaccinations members should consult professional advice.

Members, visitors and/or guests who attend club meeting at our Mulgrave meeting room are required to comply with the requirements of Monash Halls.

All person over 16 must provide proof of full vaccination to the Covid Marshal (digital or hard copy certificate) or provide an authorised exemption from a medical practitioner

Everyone needs to complete the attendance register

Attendance is capped at 4 msq per person and maintain social distancing.

All persons attending are still wear a mask

Members, visitors and/or guests who attend committee meetings, club camps or other gatherings (e.g. Christmas functions) are required to complete an attendance

register and if over 16 prove they are fully vaccinated (digital or hard copy certificate checked by Covid Marshalls or Camp Duty Officer).

Those not vaccinated for medical or other reasons need to have an authorised exemption from a medical practitioner.

While in attendance at club meetings, camps and functions social distancing is required and masks are to be worn when members gather in a group (unless eating or drinking).

As previously advised, and as is standard practice, any member who has any covid like symptoms or who has been in contact with someone with covid or suspected of having covid should not attend Seeker's activities.

It is impossible for the club to guarantee the safety of members who attend Seeker's activities. At the end of the day, it is each individual members responsibility to assess the risk posed by club activities and decide whether to participate or not.

While the committee will do its best it is difficult to keep up with all the various requirements of the Department of Health and other Victoria Government Agencies in respect of Covid, members should always comply with official Government requirements which take precedence over club policy and advice.

The committee is also of the opinion that it is possible for restrictions to ease as the vaccination rate increases and we will move with the times.

Snake bite



IN A MEDICAL EMERGENCY CALL TRIPLE ZERO (000) FOR AN AMBULANCE.

DRSABCD Danger ► Response ► Send for help ► Airway ► Breathing ► CPR ► Defibrillation

The DRSABCD Action Plan is the first step when providing first aid. Use this to assess the immediate situation.

All known or suspected snake bites must be treated as potentially life-threatening, and medical aid should be sought urgently.

WARNING

Do not wash venom off the skin or clothes because it may assist identification.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

Signs of a snake bite are not always visible and, in some cases, the patient may not have felt anything. Symptoms may not appear for an hour or more after the person has been bitten.

Depending on the type of snake, signs and symptoms may include some or all of the following:

- immediate or delayed pain at the bite site
- swelling, bruising or local bleeding
- bite marks (usually on a limb) that may vary from obvious puncture wounds to scratches that may be almost invisible
- swollen and tender glands in the groin or armpit of the bitten limb
- faintness, dizziness
- nausea and vomiting
- headache
- abdominal pain
- oozing of blood from the bite site or gums
- double or blurred vision
- drooping eyelids
- difficulty in speaking or swallowing
- limb weakness or paralysis
- difficulty in breathing
- occasionally, initial collapse or confusion followed by partial or complete recovery.

WHAT TO DO

- 1 Follow DRSABCD.
- 2 Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance.
- 3 Lie the patient down and ask them to keep still. Reassure the patient.
- 4 If on a limb, apply an elasticised roller bandage (10–15 cm wide) over the bite site as soon as possible.

Apply a further elasticised roller bandage (10–15 cm wide), starting just above the fingers or toes and moving upwards on the bitten limb as far as can be reached.

Use clothing or other material if an elasticised roller bandage is not available.

Apply the bandage as tightly as possible to the limb.
- 5 Immobilise the bandaged limb using splints.
- 6 Keep the patient lying down and completely still (immobilised).
- 7 Write down the time of the bite and when the bandage was applied. If possible, mark the location of the bite site (if known) on the skin with a pen, or photograph the site.
- 8 Stay with the patient until medical aid arrives.

HEAT EXHAUSTION

WARNING

If a person with heat exhaustion is not managed appropriately, they can develop heat stroke.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

- feeling hot, exhausted, weak, fatigued
- persistent headache
- thirst
- nausea
- faintness, dizziness
- rapid breathing, shortness of breath
- pale, cool, moist skin
- rapid, weak pulse

WHAT TO DO

- 1 Move the patient to a cool place with circulating air.
- 2 Help the patient to sit or lie down in a comfortable position.
- 3 Remove unnecessary clothing from the patient, and loosen any tight clothing.
- 4 Sponge the patient with cold water.
- 5 Give the patient cool water to drink.
- 6 Seek medical aid if the patient vomits or does not recover quickly.

HEAT STROKE

WARNING

Heat stroke is potentially life-threatening and immediate medical aid is needed.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

- high body temperature of 40°C or more
- flushed, dry skin
- pounding, rapid pulse that gradually weakens
- headache and irritability
- nausea, vomiting
- visual disturbances
- faintness, dizziness, confusion
- loss of consciousness
- seizures

WHAT TO DO

- 1 Follow DRSABCD.
- 2 Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance.
- 3 Move the patient to a cool place with circulating air.
- 4 Help the patient to sit or lie down in a comfortable position.
- 5 Remove almost all the patient's clothing, and loosen any tight clothing.
- 6 Apply a cold pack to areas of large blood vessels such as the neck, groin and armpits, to accelerate cooling.
- 7 If possible, cover the patient with a wet sheet and fan to increase air circulation. Stop cooling when the patient feels cold to touch.
- 8 If patient is fully conscious and is able to swallow, give them cool water to sip.

Remember to be considerate of others if you feel that you must use a generator

Don't use it close to other campers, take measures to mitigate the sound such as put it in a ditch or use a sound baffle, don't run it all day, and observe the 9:00 pm cut off time

We encourage you to consider charging batteries with a solar panel instead of a generator.
