

### **CLUB INSURANCE**

I would like to confirm some important information about our Club's insurance: Thank you to Michael for confirming this as there seemed to be some confusion amongst some members.

In simple terms, we have two policies. One for Associations Liability (Indemnity for Committee members from being sued), and one for Public & Products Liability.

The Public & Products Liability covers all financial & registered Club members for any damage that they may cause to non-club members Property or any Personal Injury to non-Club members that members may cause.

The policy does not cover Club members for their own Property or Personal Injury

To be covered under this policy members must be at a registered Club Camp or event pursuing Club associated activities.

If members attend a Camp or activity outside the dates on the approved permit obtained by the club for the camp duration, then they are not covered by our Insurance.

In other words if members turn up early or stay late at Camps they are not covered by the Club Insurance.

More members arrived over the next couple of days and we ended up with 24 attendees plus some day visitors (Big Paul and his wife, Peter Schmidt and a friend of his).






#### a large tray of party pies, fresh from his grill.

We look forward to the next camp, which is

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
# Vice Presidents Report

It was a small camp as the weather was threatening. Following this, we travelled up to the Seekers Camp in Tibooburra where we met up with Anja and Alistair and many other Seeker members. We shared our time between the Caravan Park, Gumvale and Mt. Stuart. Gold was tiny to say the least and I found about 25 bits which weighed 2gs. Anja found 22 bits for 2.12gs. Alistair worked hard as usual and was happy to find 7 bits for 4.13qs. We stayed in Tibooburra for about 3 weeks and then it was time to make our way to Birdsville for the 'Big Red Bash'.

The Sunland and Zone set up in the makeshift camping ground just outside of Birdsville with hundreds of caravans, campers and tents. Looked like an upmarket refugee camp. We were there for 4 nights until our early entry to the Bash for another 5 nights. It was fantastic. We really enjoyed the music and the enthusiasm of the crowd. Facilities were better than expected and a good time was had by all.



After leaving the bash we travelled the Plenty Hwy stopping a couple of times along the way. We set up in the Gemfields where we discovered Gary had contracted Covid at the Bash (along with

The E40 failed to give us the gold we were hoping for. Just a few small pieces each. We tried many different locations, but it seems we were beaten by a very keen chainer. On the right flank; Scots Guard (100 guardsmen) a gap, HM The


