

Bushfire Awareness

During Camps and especially during the bushfire season, it is the Members' responsibility to keep themselves informed of potentially hazardous or severe weather. This could be through the radio, Victorian Bushfire Information Line, the CFA website or the CFA smart phone application "FireReady", the VicEmergency website, or the Club's Bushfire Status board. VicEmergency is Victoria's primary website for incident information and warnings on fire and flood, and lists other types of emergencies and incidents.

During adverse or threatening weather conditions, Members should make a special effort to maintain UHF and/or mobile phone communications. However, as mobile phone and UHF reception is not always available, Members should periodically check for Voicemail and SMSs. Members who use a channel other than UHF Channel 12 should maintain a scan on Channel 12.

In the event that a Member detects smoke or fire, they should (not necessarily in this order):

- Refer to any Bushfire Status notification on the Club's noticeboard
 - Check if it is a local burn-off via any of:
 - VicEmergency http://www.emergency.vic.gov.au/respond/
 - CFA website <u>http://cfa.vic.gov.au</u>
 - CFA FireReady app
 - o Victorian Bushfire Information Line on 1800 226 226
- Inform the Duty Officer or a Committee Member (be it a burn-off or bushfire)
- Advise 000, if warranted



The Fire Danger Rating predicts fire behaviour (should a fire start) and how dangerous it would be to put out. The higher the rating, the more dangerous the conditions. Fire Danger Ratings feature in weather forecasts during the fire season. To check your district's daily Fire Danger Rating, visit cfa.vic.gov.au or call 1800 226 226

Vice Presidents Report



We are heading into the summer months and "touch wood" we get a break from the wet weather, boggy conditions and

mosquitoes. Our next three camps are Moonambel, Amherst and then the Rosebud Beach camp. Please see elsewhere in the newsletter for a comprehensive rundown on Rosebud including the rules and what you need to know, pricing and the booking procedure.

Moonambel Camp

For Moonambel the official dates are 26 Dec to 1 Jan 23. The camp ground has modern showers and toilets and there are some powered sites for \$15 / night and non-powered sites for \$10 / n. Members are encouraged to use the non-powered sites where possible and leave the powered sites for older members or those with medical issues. The club has made a booking so members are requested not to book sites ahead of time, just turn up and see the treasurer Kevin or President Steve about payment.

Please note water is limited to 3 large rain water tanks and there are no taps provided in the camping area. So please ensure you arrive with full water tanks for drinking and possibly for showers etc if the rain water tanks get low.

The nearest dump point is at the caravan park at Avoca.

There will of course be a New Year's Eve Function and the club has booked the airconditioned hall for this event.

There will be fun and games and the theme for the evening is Gold so bring along an outfit or a gold-coloured adornment to wear.

Eric is bringing the club BBQ and there will be free sausages and burgers but BYO salads, desert and drinks.

Guest Speakers

New Minelab detectors – Manticor and new Equinox models – Miners Den

Field Research – using GeoVic and Google Earth to help with the search for gold

4 WD and Caravan Tyres

Coin / Relic Detectors

With my hobby business finding lost jewelry for people I need a fully waterproof detector for searchers in the bay, ocean, rock pools etc. Water got into my Equinox 800 on two occasions and to their credit Minelab did replace the control box both times. While I really liked this detector I had to sell it because the warranty was about to run out. I know we have quite a few Equinox users and if you are out of warranty and plan on submerging this detector I suggest you have a look online at what users are doing to better waterproof and protect their machines.

So after selling the Nox I began the search for a replacement unit and was surprised at the number of options now available for coin / relic hunters who also want a gold and beach / water mode. I cannot go into any detail but below are some of the detectors I looked at in the last few months.

Minelab Manticore \$2500 waterproof 5 m, 11" coil, 3 year warranty, 2 dimensional ID map

XP Deus II (dive ready version) \$2148 – 5 year warranty & 20 m waterproof. Wireless but need antenna in water.

Minelab new Equinox 900 (\$1699) waterproof 5 m, 11 & 6 " coils, 3 year warranty

Garret AT Max \$1575 (and they also have their GPX 6000 equivalent – the Axiom \$7385)

Nokta – The Legend. \$1000 - \$1250 propack with extra battery and 6 inch coil etc. Great value machine especially with additional inclusions and/or discounts. 3 m waterproof and 3 year warranty.

After looking I opted for the Nokta The Legend with propack because it also had a \$250 black Friday discount. If you are in the market please do your own research but happy to discuss. PS at the Wicks Reserve end of year function I managed to find the most tokens with the Nokta after only using it previously for a couple of hours.

Hope you all have a happy holiday season and better new year (won't be hard for most....)

ROSEBUD BEACH CAMP 17–23 FEB

ROSEBUD BEACH CAMP 17 FEB 23

Hi Members,

As announced at meetings and in the last Newsletter the club is conducting a beach camp at the Rosebud Foreshore Camp Ground for the first time from Friday 17 Feb 2023 for 7 nights. It is obviously different to our traditional bush camp looking for gold but there will still be lots of metal detecting to be done as well as a range of other fun activities which you would associate with a visit to the Mornington Peninsula.

For many it will be like a beach holiday with friends so you might like to put aside some extra holiday money if you would like to participate in some of the optional organised activities. The committee realizes that things like this can be costly so the emphasis will be planning a number of fun, low cost or free activities (see below).

The Offer

You might remember that the club has a very good post school holiday deal of 7 nights for the price of 4. The cost is \$168 per site for members and sites will be allocated on a first come first served basis from the release of this Newsletter. Please note the Foreshore Camp Ground has not offered any other rates but continue to read below for other options. Full disclosure – up to ten members of the core committee that will be most involved in planning and running this activity will be allocated the first ten sites. This is also because the club also needs to pay for a minimum of ten sites in Dec to secure our booking.

Booking Procedure

Tony Pappas has been appointed as the "Booking Manager"(BM) for the club and will allocate sites to members based on your Caravan size. Current club members who book and pay in full for the 7 nights will be allocated the first sites on first in best dressed basis. Members who are not able to stay for the full 7 nights have a choice to pay in full to secure a site or advise the BM of their preferred dates and wait until later in January to see if their request can be met (see below for details and other options).

The booking procedure is as follows :

- Name and age of any onsite member guests (site maximum is 6 and max 4 adults)

- Van size - length (including drawbar) and width in meters

- Size of any other guest tents, gazebo's etc

- Vehicle make and rego (only one vehicle allowed per site)

- Arrival and departure date if different to the official camp dates

- Preferred arrival time Friday after 11 am and departure time Friday before 11 am

- The Booking Manager (BM) will reply to your email with

- a site number
- allocated arrival and departure time
- payment options

- Member then accepts and pays VSC in full by mid Jan 23 or declines ASAP

- I will just be doing day trips but please keep me informed about the camp via email

Members may request a separate guest site but these will be only made available in early February if available. We have had occasions in the past where guests attending camps have been loud and disruptive so any adult guests or prospective members will be subject to committee approval. Under no circumstances are members to contact the Rosebud Foreshore Camping Ground Office about our camp. All member questions can be directed to Steve H, Paul H or Tony Pappas (phone numbers and email addresses are in the Newsletter).

Arrival & Departures

Because we are all potentially arriving and departing on the same day it is important that arrival and departure times are staggered. Members will be asked to nominate a preferred arrival and departure time and the BM will then confirm a time with you. Please arrive as close as possible to you arrival and departure time. On arrival it is planned for a member of the committee to be on hand to help with getting you onto your site.

Unlike our normal camps there is no arriving a day or two before, or leaving a day or two after the official camp dates.

- Tourist Activities - Fishing hire boats, 9 holes golf, Wine tour, Spa visit. Details and booking maybe required in Jan / early Feb.


- Cheap / Free fun stuff – metal detecting, beach / pier fishing, walking, markets, national

Camp Rules & other things you should know

Before you commit to the trip and book your site please see below to ensure you can live with the following.



Doug's latest book has just been released - "Coin & Relic Detecting in Australia" which is the companion to Doug's popular "Metal Detecting for Gold in Australia".

- The Camp Ground is right on, and open to, the busy Point Nepean Road (some sites are within 20-30 m of the road)

- While we are very close to the beach there are sand dunes, trees and beach boxes which means you will need to walk about 50 to 100 m to see the bay.

- Tourists and locals use walking / bike tracks through the Camp Ground all the time

- Unfortunately, theft is a common occurrence in the camp grounds and you should secure / lock everything all the time

- Expect it to be noisier than our normal camps at night, especially on the weekend. All noise in camp to stop by 11 pm.

- The toilets and shower block has been renovated but are on the small side and won't always be spotless

- Dump point 1681 Point Nepean Road, Rosebud West, Victoria

- No pets of any description are allowed

- Alcohol consumption is confined to allocated sites

- Campers must ensure a 2-metre clearance between sites for fire services

- Only gas or electric BBQs allowed. No solid fuel fires are permitted at any time

- Only one vehicle is allowed on each site (and no sleeping is allowed in cars). 4 kmph speed limit.

- We have been allocated our own section of the Camp Ground but once every one is on site it will be quite packed and similar to most caravan parks

- Not all sites are level and some are not quite rectangular. There are lots of large pine and other trees on site

- There are about 40 sites and most are around the 9 to 10 m long by 5 to 6 m wide.

- All sites have access to power (bring long power cords). However, there are only half a dozen taps so you will not be connected to water.

Bring a long hose to top up your tanks or ask a committee member to borrow one.

- As with our normal camps members will be responsible for their guest behavior and safety

- The Camp Ground staff have the right to terminate your stay for breaches

- We do need to be mindful that not everyone thinks that detectorists are cool. Use common sense but as a guide

- don't detect on a busy beach, camp ground or playground (in water or out on sand flats at low tide is generally OK)

- use your earphones or turn your external speakers down low

- fill in all holes even on the beach or sand flats at low tide

- in parks avoid using picks and larger digging implements unless no one is around.

Take a plug and replace it. Ideally no one should see where we have been digging.

- only detect in small groups (pairs or threes) and even then, spread out

- lets agree not to detect in our section of the


