#### **Bushfire Awareness**

During Camps and especially during the bushfire season, it is the Members' responsibility to keep themselves informed of potentially hazardous or severe weather. This could be through the radio, Victorian Bushfire Information Line, the CFA website or the CFA smart phone application "FireReady", the VicEmergency website, or the Club's Bushfire Status board. VicEmergency is Victoria's primary website for incident information and warnings on fire and flood, and lists other types of emergencies and incidents.

During adverse or threatening weather conditions, Members should make a special effort to maintain UHF and/or mobile phone communications. However, as mobile phone and UHF reception is not always available, Members should periodically check for Voicemail and SMSs. Members who use a channel other than UHF Channel 12 should maintain a scan on Channel 12.

In the event that a Member detects smoke or fire, they should (not necessarily in this order):

- Refer to any Bushfire Status notification on the Club's noticeboard
- Check if it is a local burn-off via any of: ○
   VicEmergency http://www.emergency.vic.gov.au/respond/
- CFA website http://cfa.vic.gov.au
- CFA FireReady app
- Victorian Bushfire Information Line on 1800 226
- Inform the Duty Officer or a Committee Member (be it a burn-off or bushfire)
- · Advise 000, if warranted

## Moora Camp Report

Once upon a time there was a liiiiiiitle group called the Seekers. Our group all have one thing in common: we all have OCD to dig holes for an elusive type of shiny metal. From Sun 5th to 12th Nov 2023 we went on an adventure to a tiny town called Moora. Some members are so obsessed that they even turned up a day or two early, however one member wasn't aware of the differing camp schedule this month and turned up well into the camp on Thursday. 51 people attended in 32 camps with departures varying from Cup Day all the way up to the following Monday.

The weather was warm right from the outset, great for those that don't like the colder camps. But that warmth turned into too much of a good thing - it got hotter as the days passed and many seemed to suffer in the heat, even those not out detecting. Friday turned out to be a scorching 34 degrees and ultimately led quite a few to throw in the towel and head back early that day or Saturday. But the gamble to leave didn't pay off since a nice cool change arrived Saturday after lunch, and that night was downright cold. The handful of remaining campers scrambled for jackets and extra blankets. At 6:45am Monday morning there was reportedly an earthquake just north of Moora which a few members said they felt.

On Sunday Steve, Eric and Lachie followed Anthony, (someone Steve met at the Tarnagulla camp) to a specific location to learn all about crystal fossicking. There they learned about how they're formed, where and how to dig, what to look for and how to recover the crystals. The next day they brought other members who were interested to pass on that

knowledge. Members spent a few hours digging and sifting for crystals, with only a few nicer finds. Rob S went out on his own a day or two later and found larger crystals hiding under the leaf litter on another side of that same hill, but when he directed everyone back to that rainbow nobody else could find it.

Tuesday (Cup Day) brought a BBQ of sausages and beef patties sourced from a local butcher. They came with bread, fried onions, and a freshly made salad on the side. This was gobbled down quite nicely by all. Yummy! After that magnificent feast came the fun. We played the old favourite "Stake your claim", never letting go of that dream to strike it rich. And a lucky few did: Robert H took out the first prize of \$100, Rob S the second prize of \$50, and Tracey H won the third prize of \$30. There apparently was a horse race on that day too. Some members didn't know or care about that but nevertheless thank the horses for giving them a long weekend plus a chance to win another prize. There were three sweeps run, the club contributing to the prize pools. First prizes were \$50. Not bad for a \$3 entry.



Notable shiny finds were Laurie with a nice 12 grammer, and several pieces of 1 to 1.5g by others. A good range of smaller finds too as usual.

Due to the heat many people finished up detecting around lunchtime most days and spent the afternoons and evenings relaxing at camp, so perhaps the finds would have been greater if more time was spent out there detecting.



Saturday afternoon after most people had left, another unnamed member in a vehicle not designed for off-roading took a wrong turn onto a dry river bed (which by the way looked amazingly similar to nearby roads). Shortly thereafter he and the passenger got stuck in the soft sand. Fortunately after just a half hour of recovery attempts they managed to drive up the banks into firmer bushland and then dodge all the trees and dig-holes back to the road. Out of curiosity they tried to use their radio to see if they could contact other members but it seems they were too far away. Or perhaps had left

the radio on the wrong channel – ch12 was too chattery this camp so was changed to ch16. Nobody responded. So the main take-away from this incident is to ensure you have enough alcohol in your car if for some reason you can't make it back to camp for happy hour. As a bonus for you, your passenger and your future

rescuers you will be feeling much more cheerful before and during the rescue. You can even offer some to the rescu-



Then it was time to start packing up and head home.



I hope all who attended had a good day out. I know Marj and I did.


